



Global Library Statistics 1990 – 2000

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Introduction

This is a first attempt to provide a snapshot of the world's libraries. The compilation of accurate, up-to-date and reliable statistics on a global level involves combining data from two sources, UNESCO¹ and Libecon².

The availability of global data lags behind that of nationally available statistics. Although international standards on library statistics (ISO 2789) and performance indicators (ISO 11620) are used internationally, not all countries collect the same data or include the same sectors. This inevitably leads to gaps in country data and sometimes whole sectors e.g. registered users for school libraries.

New media and electronic services are largely underrepresented, as the data is often not available. As data collection criteria evolve to take ICTs into account and as international standards are updated, it should be possible in future to obtain global statistical information on the role of libraries in the information society. For now, we can provide some regional data.

The value of statistics is as an advocacy and lobby tool to illustrate to policy-makers, politicians and partners how libraries provide access to our cultural and scientific heritage; contribute to the development of the knowledge economy; support the democratic process; help bridge the digital divide; support lifelong literacy; represent good value for money.

Data in the tables has been converted into a selection of *Fast Facts* for re-use and comparison.

Sources & Notes

Two sources were used to compile the statistics, UNESCO and Libecon. This means there are some anomalies between the datasets. Where possible, data has been harmonised.

- 1. Data for the latest available year has been used. Where a country has not submitted data for the latest year, then the last year for which data was submitted has been used. For example, the last year for which China submitted data for loan transactions in education libraries was in 1990.
- 2. Not all member countries appear to submit their data UNESCO, even though detailed statistics are available nationally e.g. Australia. To take into account missing data, some figures have been increased by 15%, noted in the table.
- 3. The United States are not members of UNESCO, so US data has been taken from Libecon.
- 4. UNESCO education data refers to tertiary education. Libecon education data refers to higher education. Therefore, the US education data refers to higher education.
- 5. UNESCO financial data is in US dollars. Libecon financial data is in Euro. The Libecon data was converted from Euro to US dollars. Exchange rate 24.7.2003 http://www.oanda.com/convert/classic.

UNESCO

The UNESCO data is taken from the latest official publication, the 1999 Statistical Yearbook (see footnote 1). The statistics are based mainly on figures from 1997. Data from some countries in some categories is missing in the UNESCO figures.

Table 1 shows a list of countries covered by UNESCO.

Libecon

Libecon is a European Commission funded research study into international library economics (see footnote 2). The data is taken from the published spreadsheets. The Libecon data is based mainly on figures from 2000 and includes data for new media and services.
