Report from Council I

The first session of Council was held Sunday 19 August. After words of welcome from President Christine Deschamps, Gary Strong reported on behalf of the National Organizing Committee. He informed the audience of the latest attendance figures: already at this stage we are breaking all records!

Following, Ross Shimmon - IFLA Secretary General - submitted his Annual Report; his conclusion was that the Federation is healthy, but as always more members are very welcome.

Tributes were made to two IFLA key figures, who had passed away recently. Birgitta Bergdahl, formerly Director of the IFLA/ALP Programme at the University of Uppsala, Sweden and Anne Galler, who served IFLA in many capacities, lastly as Chair of the Section for Library Services to Disadvantaged Persons.

The Section for Library Services to Disadvantaged Persons is celebrating its 70th anniversary, which makes it one of IFLA's oldest sections!

Council then adopted two proposals to create new membership categories: in future we will have special membership provisions (and fees) for sub-units of institutions and for one-person libraries and school libraries.

Adolfo Rodriguez, Chair of Division 8 reported on behalf of the Advisory Group that was installed in Bangkok (1999).He presented 10 points summarizing the findings of the Advisory Group, which lead to the following conclusion: "Division 8 should not be dissolved, instead IFLA, the Division, ALP, the Regional Offices and the Sections should work together towards fostering development in the countries comprising the regional groups. Its objective would be to ensure more active participation in IFLA, along with advice and activities aimed at strengthening library and information education associations. and professionalism."

After the official business had been concluded, John Berry, President of the American Library Association (ALA) came to the stage to present a very special gift to IFLA by launching the Campaign for the World's Libraries, based upon the ALA campaign "@your library", and unveiling a new logo.

IFLA/FAIFE releases firstever World Report on Libraries and Intellectual Freedom at IFLA Conference

The report on libraries and intellectual freedom will be released tomorrow. The report includes information on the state of intellectual freedom in libraries in 46 of the world's nations, from Albania to Zimbabwe.

"Libraries have a crucial role to play. They are an essential tool for the achievement of democracy and social development," said IFLA President Christine Deschamps. Libraries must reflect the plurality and diversity of society, opposing all forms of censorship without being influenced by any political, moral or religious opinions.

"This first IFLA/FAIFE World Report is a major project, a first attempt to provide a picture on the status of libraries and intellectual freedom throughout the world. More than 140 countries have been contacted, and 46 have submitted their report. The result is very encouraging since this kind of information had never previously been put together nor published on a global basis.

"The IFLA/FAIFE World Report is a living document, and more countries will join the project in the future. The World Report is a living proof of the global aspects of IFLA/FAIFE and of IFLA's support to democracy and development."

IFLA/FAIFE Committee Chair Alex Byrne, said: "This first edition of the IFLA/FAIFE World Report reflects the achievements of the first four years of the IFLA/FAIFE initiative. The World Report will become a key guide to issues confronting libraries in providing free access to information for their clients. The reports published in this edition begin to map the state of intellectual freedom in relation to libraries. They confirm that not all is well with the state of freedom of access to information and freedom of expression in the world.

"From Turkmenistan to Timor, we too frequently see books burned, libraries destroyed or dismembered, and librarians intimidated or worse," Byrne added.

The issues addressed in the report vary widely, including: Internet censorship in Australia, arrest of a librarian for collecting resources in China and destruction of libraries in Kosovo.


