So please, do not forget your confirmation letters when you come to the Opening Session at the Colon Theatre!


# **KEYNOTE SPEAKER AND PLENARY SPEAKERS AT IFLA 2004**

# **TOMÁS ELOY MARTÍNEZ**

Key Note Speaker at Opening Session Date of the conference: Monday, August 23 Opening Session. Time: 09.00 to 10.30 Title: The book in Globalization times

Mr. Eloy Martínez was born in Tucuman in the north of Argentina. It was there that he graduated in Literature, later going on to Paris where he completed his doctorate, writing his thesis on Borges. His intense and committed journalistic

activity has obliged him to spend various periods in exile. Currently he is the director of Latin American studies at Rutgers University, New Jersey, USA. In his novels one can appreciate, apart



from his literary talent, his capacity for obtaining and organising historical documents carefully guarded by all the sectors that have played a role in the Argentine drama of recent years. This is particularly true for his books *La Novela de Peron and Santa Evita*. (See more about him at:

Born in Montevideo, Uruguay. Former Foreign Affaires Minister from Uruguay. Former member of numerous Human Rights Committee missions. Ph.

D in Laws and Social Sciences. Professor of Constitutional Law. Emeritus Professor at the Laws Faculty (Universidad de la República, Uruguay), Professor of International Laws. Professor of Human Rights. Distiguished Professor (Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México). Honoris Causa Professor (Universidad de Concepción, Chile). Was twice Professor at the International Laws Academy (The Hague, Netherlands). Gave courses in differents universities from Latin America and overseas: Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay, Chile, Peru, Ecuador, Colombia, Venezuela, Bolivia, Panama, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Honduras, El Salvador, Guatemala, Mexico, Spain, Italy, Germany, Switzerland, Japan, Egypt, etc. Member of the History and Geography Institute from Uruguay. Member of the National Literature Academy from Uruguay. Member of Scientific and Juridical associations realted to Politics and Human Rights in Brazil, Chile, Peru, Paraguay, Bolivia, Ecuador, Venezuela, Mexico, France, Belgium, etc. Member of Institut de Droit International. Member of the American Spanish-Portuguese International Law Institut, President of ALDHU (Human Rights Latin American Association). President of the UNESCO so called Consulting Committee for the Teaching of Human Rights, Democracy, Tolerance and Peace. Member of the Academic Committee for UNESCO Chair on Human Rights (Universidad de la República, Uruguay). Board Member of the Istituto Internazionale de Studi sui Diritti del Uomo (Trieste, Italy).

#### ISMAIL SERAGELDIN

Date of the conference: Tuesday, August 24 Time: 12.45 to 13.45 Plenary Session II

**Title:** *Bibliotheca Alexandrina, Past. Present and Future* 



Ismail Serageldin is Egyptian, born in Guiza. He is tri-lingual: Arabic, French and English. Received education in Cairo University. (B. Sc. 1964, First Class Honors) and Harvard University (M.R.P. 1968, With Distinction and Ph.D, 1972). Currently, Mr. Serageldin is the Director of Bibliotheca Alexandrina. He is Distinguished University Professor, Wageningen University, the Netherlands. Also serves as chair and member of a number of advisory committees for academic, research, scientific and international institutions and civil society efforts.

Among others, he has the following honorary degrees: Doctor of Sociology, University of Bucharest, Romania; Doctor of International Affairs, American University, Washington, DC, USA; Doctor of Science, Tamil Nadu Agricultural University, Coimbatore, India and Doctor of Economics and Management, CNAM, Paris, France)

Worked in a number of capacities at the World Bank since joining in 1972. Economist in education and human resources; Division Chief for Technical Assistance and Special Studies, and for Urban Projects in Europe, the Middle East and North Africa; Director for Programs in West Africa. Country Director for Central and Occidental Africa, Technical Director for all Sub-Saharan Africa, and Vice-President for **Environmentally and Socially Sustainable** Development. In addition, he was active in promoting NGO-Bank relations, and served as Co-Chairman of the NGO-Bank Committee. Prior to joining the World Bank, worked as a consultant in city and regional planning, and taught at Cairo University and Harvard University. Over 50 books and monographs (edited or authored) and 200 articles, book chapters, and technical papers on various topics, including: Nurturing Development, Sustainability and the

Wealth of Nations, Architecture of
Empowerment, Rural Well-Being: From Vision to
Action (with David Steeds), The Modernity of
Shakespeare, Biotechnology and Biosafety (with
Wanda Collins), Very Special Places and
Promethean Science (with G. Persley). (See more

#### **MEMPO GIARDINELLI**

Date of the conference: Wednesday, August 25 Time: 12.45 to 13.45 - Plenary Session III Title: The library in the life of a writer



Argentine writer, born in Resistencia, Chaco, where he lives at the present time. He lived in exile in Mexico between 1976 and 1984. He was the founder and director of the magazine *Puro Cuento*. His literary

work has been translated into 20 languages and has won several literary awards, including the Rómulo Gallegos Prize in 1993.

Giardinelli is the author of the following novels: La revolución en bicicleta, El cielo con las manos, Luna caliente, Qué solos se quedan los muertos, Santo Oficio de la Memoria, Imposible Equilibrio, El Décimo Infierno, Cuestiones Interiores. His most recent piece of work is Visita después de hora. His several storybooks include Vidas ejemplares, El castigo de Dios, and his latest piece of literary work for children Cuentos con mi papá. In addition to novels, he has written essays (El género negro y El País de las Maravillas, among others). In September 2000, he was awarded in Spain the Great Travellers prize for his novel Final de novela en Patagonia.

He usually collaborates in Argentine and Latin American newspapers and magazines, and has published articles and short stories nearly all round the world. His articles regularly appear in newspapers from Argentina and other countries such as Spain, Paraguay, Mexico, Chile and Uruguay. He taught at the Iberoamerican



University in Mexico; was a professor in the Faculty of Journalism and Social Communications of the National University of La Plata and for 20 years, has been a visiting professor at several universities in the United States, especially at the University of Virginia. Besides, he is Professor Honoris Causa at the Universidad Nacional del Nordeste (UNNE) and the Universidad del Norte in Asunción. He is a member of the Advisory Council of the Memory Provincial Committee of the Province of Buenos Aires.

In 1996, he donated his own personal library comprised of 10,000 volumes, for the establishment of a foundation, located in Chaco, devoted to the promotion of books and reading and the teaching and research of the pedagogy of reading. In the provinces of the North East of Argentina, dozens of libraries have been set up by the Giardinelli Foundation, which is in charge of supporting them and of carrying out different activities every year: www.fundamgiardinelli.org.ar

#### **EMILIA FERREIRO**

Date of the conference: Thursday, August 26 Time: 12.45 to 13.45 - Plenary Session IV Title: Computer, digital or multimedia literacy (in school settings, particularly in Latin American countries)

Argentine researcher, who lives in Mexico, specialized in literacy processes. She earned her doctorate degree from the University of Geneva, and was guided



by Jean Piaget on her thesis. She has received six Doctor Honoris Causa (from the University of Athens, Greece; from the Rio de Janeiro State University, Brazil; and four, from National Universities of Argentina, including the University of Buenos Aires and the University of Córdoba). She has been awarded the Order of Educational Merit by the Government of Brazil, and the Order of Andrés Bello by the Government of Venezuela.

Currently she is tenure professor at the

Educational Research Department of the Center of Research and Advanced Studies (Centro de Investigaciones y Estudios Avanzados – CINVESTAV) at the National Polytechnic Institute (Instituto Politécnico Nacional – IPN), Mexico City (highest rank).

The publication of Los sistemas de escritura en el desarrollo del niño, signalled the beginning of a series of constant publications documenting her researh on the psychogenesis of written language. The book, co-written with Ana Teberosky, was translated into English, Italian and Portuguese; and it became significantly important in the academic and educational fields almost immediately. In 1999, several celebrations were held in her honor in Mexico City, Buenos Aires, Rosario and Córdoba (Argentina) and Porto Alegre (Brazil), on occasion of the 20th. Anniversary of the publication of her book, which has been constantly in print. The conclusions drawn from her research work have been published as articles in specialized journals in Spanish, French, English, Italian and Portuguese. She is a member of the Editorial Board of several specialized magazines published in U.S.A, England, Italy, Spain, France and Argentina.

#### MARGARITA VANNINI

Date of the conference: Friday, August 27 Time: 12.45 to 13.45 - Plenary Session V Title: UNESCO Memory of the World Programme in Latin America

Margarita Vannini was born in Nicaragua. She graduated from the University of Costa Rica and earned a masters degree in Central American History. She has a



bachelor's degree in Education and earned mention in Social Sciences. UNAN – Managua. Since 1990 she has been the Managing Director of the Nicaragua and Central America History Institute (IHNCA), a branch of the Central American Unviversity (UCA). She was a

professor of Nicaraguan History and coordinator of the Research and Development Council from the Social Sciences department at the National Autonomous University of Nicaragua (UNAN). Besides, she was a member of the coordinating team of the Oral History Project Historic rescue of the popular participation in the fight against the Somoza dictatorship (UNAN) – National Literacy Campaign – Ministry of Culture. She is the author of Semblanza de Nicaragua en el Siglo XX, published by the Instituto de Historia de Nicaragua y Centroamérica and, and co-author of Apuntes de Historia de Nicaragua and La Insurrección Popular Sandinista en el Departamento de Masaya.

She has also written several papers and articles; her latest work includes Memory of the World Program (MOW) from the UNESCO and its development in the Region, presented in the V Meeting of Archive Directors of the MERCOSUR, Asunción Paraguay, May 2003, and the establishment of the guidelines for the Memory of the World Program, presented in the MERCOSUR Seminar on Human Rights Archives, Chile, September 2003.

As an editor, it is worth mentioning the journal Revista de Historia, Special Issue; La Geografía Histórica como Ciencia Social: Metodologías interdisciplinarias en el análisis del espacio mesoamericano, Managua, IP; the general coordination of the Nicaraguan Encyclopedia, and the Memorias del Seminario Sociedad, Política y Cultura en Centroamérica, (co-editor), IHNCA, Managua.

She has made an outstanding contribution to international organizations: as president of the "Teaching of History" Committee, IPGH (2001-2004), and as a member of the Regional Committee for Latin America and the Caribbean of the Memory of the World Program from the UNESCO.

She was awarded the title of the "Knight of Arts and Letters" by the government of France in February 2001

All airlines flying to Argentina arrive at Ministro Pistarini (Ezeiza) International Airport, which is 35 Km away from the City of Buenos Aires. You can reach the city by Teniente General Ricchieri freeway.

Company Manuel Tienda León (Tel. 00 54 11 4314-3636, 0810-888-5366, www.tiendaleon.com) and Transfer Express (Tel. 00 54 11 4852-6776, 0800-4444-872) offer a bus service from Ezeiza Airport to the city. The trip takes approximately 40 minutes. There are also taxis and chauffeur-driven rented cars. FOR YOUR OWN SECURITY: please only use taxis from the authorized stands located inside the airport and do NOT accept offers from drivers that come up to you either inside or outside the airport.

REMEMBER THAT IF YOU ARRIVE TO EZEIZA INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT ON SATURDAY, AUGUST 21 OR ON SUNDAY, AUGUST 22, THERE WILL BE FREE BUS TRANSPORTATION AVAILABLE TO HOTELS LOCATED WITHIN DOWNTOWN AREA. Please, show the letter with your confirmation number at Tienda León counter (Ezeiza Airport main hall).

# How to get to the Hilton and the Sheraton hotels and how to travel around Buenos Aires

There are several bus lines (known as "colectivos") that stop a few metres away from both hotels. Bus lines are identified with numbers. These are the bus lines that bring you to Hilton and Sheraton Hotels: 5, 6, 7, 9, 15, 23, 26, 28, 45, 61, 62, 92, 75, 93, 99, 100, 106, 108, 109, 115, 126, 129, 130, 152, 140, 146.

The service is available 24 hours a day. The fixed fare is 0,80 Argentine Pesos. Tickets are paid with coins on site.

There will be a permanent free shuttle between Hilton and Sheraton hotels (the 2 conference venues) during Conference working hours. Travelling through Buenos Aires is very easy. Its five subway lines (commonly known as "subtes") converge upon downtown, the main touristic and hotel area. The subway is the fastest means of transport making it the choice for the "porteños" (Buenos Aires citizens). It is connected with the main avenues and railway and bus stations. There are two subway (underground) lines that are a 10 minute walk away from Hilton Hotel - if you want to stretch your legs a bit - (A Line: Plaza de Mayo Station and B Line: Leandro N. Alem Station).

There is one subway (underground) line that is located 100 meters away from Sheraton Hotel (C Line: Retiro Station)

The schedule is from Monday to Saturday, from 6 am to 11 pm and on Sundays from 8 am to 10 pm. The fare is flat (0.70 pesos argentinos) and payable at the ticket offices located in the different stations. Each ticket may be used to go to any point of the city, even for long trips combining several lines.

Keep in mind that all delegates and Accompanying persons will receive a special pass for free subway transportation, valid from Sunday August 22 to Friday August 27.

Taxis are another good option to go through the City of Buenos Aires, with a fleet of more than 32.000 cars. The fare is composed of an initial price and an additional value charged according to the distance covered and time elapsed. The fare is viewed on the taximeter that displays 1.28 Argentine Peso (\$) when the trip begins and adds \$ 0.16 every two hundred meters (about two blocks). Taxis in Buenos Aires are painted in yellow and black.

#### Banks

Banks open at 10 am and close between 3 and 4 pm from Mondays to Fridays. Cash extractions and other transactions (except exchange operations) may be made in ATMs, 24 hours a day.

#### Currency

Argentine currency is the peso (\$). It has a free quotation. Foreign currencies can be freely exchanged in official exchange offices (Casa de Cambio). We strongly do not recommend to exchange currency with persons offering in the street, even when they offer better quotation. Currently, the exchange rate in Argentina favors the foreign tourist. Shops accept credit cards (almost all shops accept Visa, Mastercard, Diners and American Express), dollars, pesos and travellers'checks. Take into account that all prices are shown in pesos (\$). Prices in US dolars are shown as U\$S or USD.

#### **Business hours**

Shops in downtown and commercial areas open Monday through Friday from 9:00 to 20:00. Shopping arcades and malls open daily from 10 to 22.

#### Climate

August is not the coldest month in winter, with mean temperatures ranging from 3° to 15° C, and frosts are infrequent in Buenos Aires. A woolen coat, a jacket or an overcoat will be required when going out. The climate of Buenos Aires - oceanic and warm - is mild all year round. The mean annual temperature is 18° C (64.4° F), making extremely hot and cold days very infrequent. Thus, visitors can enjoy walking along the city in any season.

**Electricity** 

The electricity used is of 220 v (volts) and 50Hz (Hertz).

# **Calling from Buenos Aires**

Public phones operate with "chip" cards or with coins. These phones accept urban, national and international calls. There are also "Locutorios" where national and international calls can be made.

#### Tips

Tips are not included in the bills. There is not a fixed percentage for tips. The amount will greatly depend on the quality of the attention and service received by the customer. In bars, when the bill is small, it is habitual to leave some coins, between 5% and 10% of total expense. In restaurants, a tip amounting to 10% of the bill is usual.

# THE ARGENTINE BIBLIOTHECOLOGY (BIBLIOTECOLOGÍA ARGENTINA) WILL BE INTRODUCED TO THE WORLD IN A SPECIAL **ISSUE OF THE JOURNAL "REFERENCIAS"**

The National Association of Graduate Librarians of the Republic of Argentina (Asociación de Bibliotecarios Graduados de la República Argentina –ABGRA), jointly with outstanding librarians of different regions of the country, have worked, under the supervision of Prof. Susana Romanos, Director of the Instituto de Investigaciones Bibliotecológicas from the University of Buenos Aires, on the preparation of a special issue of the official publication of the Association, Journal "Referencias".

This special issue will include an overview on Argentine libraries and will focus on the actual situation of education, on the research studies in the field of librarianship, and on the Argentine association movement. It will be published in English and Spanish and will be handed out to all participants of IFLA 2004.

# ISBN AGENCIES INTERNATIONAL MEETING

Due to an initiative developed by the International ISBN Agency with headquarters in Berlin, the Argentine Publisher Association (Cámara Argentina del Libro), and the Regional Centre for Book Development in Latin America and the Caribbean (Centro Regional para el Fomento del Libro en América Latina y el Caribe - CERLALC), the ISBN Agencies Annual Meeting will be held between August 19-21 in the city of Buenos Aires, Argentina, as one of the activities to take place before the commencement of the World Library and Information Congress: 70th IFLA General Conference and Council.

Representatives of the 20 Iberoamerican member states are expected to attend the Meeting, where, together with the Director of the International Agency, Dr. Hartmut Walravens, several issues will be discussed: the ISBN System, new technologies, and special emphasis will be placed on the application and impact of the new standard ISO 2108, which will be enforced as from the year 2007.

# **POPULAR LIBRARIES**

The CONABIP is a national organization dependent on the Secretariat of Culture of the Nation. Its main objective is the support, promotion and development of popular libraries. There are more than 2,000 Popular



Libraries throughout all the country, 32 mobile libraries and one boat libary. The Popular Library is an autonomous and independent organization, which offers information and consulting services. It is a place devoted to cultural expansion and promotion, and is in charge of developing initiatives such as related activities, recreational programmes, sociocultural performances, and the promotion of reading and popular education

It is their aim to rescue the popular culture, to facilitate access to information, to restore solidarity bonds and to ensure that people participate more fully.

It is open to all sectors of the community without any kind of discrimination.

# Participation in IFLA 2004

The National Commission for the Protection of Popular Libraries (Comisión Nacional Protectora de Bibliotecas Populares – CONABIP) will take part in the IFLA World Library and Information Congress 2004, for which it has planned a series of activities:

a) Two Popular Libraries will be visited; they have been included in the Library Visits programme. Transportation will be provided. b) In the Computer Forum to be held during the Conference, the CONABIP will make a presentation on the proposed topic: "Overcoming the Digital Gap in Latin America" (in the section of Public Libraries of the IFLA).

c) In the "Area for Popular Culture" in front of the Hilton Hotel.

The Popular Libraries will be represented at the stands of their own provinces, grouped by regions, where daily activities will be held: demonstrations on the methodology of the animation of reading, tango-lessons workshops, literary cafés, artistic and cultural programmes characteristic of each region, conferences (where simultaneous translation is included), informal talks and round tables.

In addition, every stand will display a variety of touristic and cultural options according to each region: music, handicrafts, gastronomy, tourist information, etc. All workshops will require prior enrollment as well as attendance to some of the artistic activities. The programme of activities will be handed out to the delegates together with the information on the Congress.

24. The Library and Popular Museum "Juan N. Madero" (Biblioteca y Museo Popular Juan N. Madero) – Constitución 662 (1646) San Fernando, Province of Buenos Aires. www.conabip.gov.ar

It was founded in 1873, its beautiful building was specially constructed to house a library in 1911. It has been open without interruption for 131 years and was mentioned by Sarmiento in his Complete Works by recognizing Juan Nepomuceno Madero to have set an example as a librarian. Currently, the library is comprised of 90,000 volumes and it is declared Provincial and Municipal Historical Monument. There will be transport facilities available for those who are interested in visiting the library.

25. The Popular Library "Sarmiento" (Biblioteca Popular Sarmiento) - Juan D. Perón Avenue 3065, Valentín Alsina, Province of Buenos Aires. www.bsarmiento.com.ar

It was founded in 1918. It is an entity which has its roots in the community tradition, supported by its own means and visited by a significant number of readers: 6,000 per month. It has an astronomic observatory and a micro cinema with a capacity of 100 people. Besides, the Board for Historical Studies "Valentín Alsina" (Junta de Estudios Históricos de Valentín Alsina) meets there. It is placed within a community made up of 300,000 inhabitants and it is currently comprised of a total of 30,000 books. There will be transport facilities available for those who are interested in visiting the library.

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
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
