4th IFLA International Marketing Award

The IFLA Section on Management and Marketing, in collaboration with SirsiDynix, is pleased to announce the winners of the 4th International Marketing Award for 2006.

First place was awarded to **Cindy van Kranenberg** from the public library of Spijenisse, near Rotterdam in the Netherlands, for a simple but costeffective marketing campaign to attract non-user patrons by sending a simple postcard. The library also evaluated the number of non-users who became users. The marketing slogan is 'We miss you' (in Dutch, 'Wij missen u'). The first-place winner has received airfare, lodging and registration for WLIC 2006 in Seoul and a cash award of USD 1,000 to further the marketing efforts of the library. Second place was awarded to **Suzanne Payette**, President of Public Libraries of Quebec for developing a topical and unique marketing campaign entitled 'Follow the Stream' (in French: 'Suivez le courant') during the Week of Public Libraries of Quebec in Fall 2005, offering sustainable promotion material in reusable shopping bags.

Third place was awarded to the Regional Library Service of Castilla-La Mancha, Spain, for the campaign entitled 'Public Libraries: No Need to Knock' (in Spanish: 'Biblioteca Publica, pasa sin Ilamar'). Oscar Arroyo Ortega, project chair, states that the campaign's main objective was to inform citizens about the new public library and its new social functions and services.

Second and third place winners will be awarded distinctions.

Some changes and additional information on the programme for this session have been announced:

One of the eight United Nations Millennium Development Goals is 'Combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases'. Libraries and information services have an important role to play by safeguarding free and unhampered access to information about the HIV/AIDS pandemic, thus helping people better understand the disease and make informed decisions regarding prevention and treatment. Public libraries can also help overcome religious and cultural barriers that may hinder these efforts in some countries.

FAIFE has started to systematically collect information on how libraries address this responsibility, including partnerships established between libraries and local NGOs. The initial findings are published in the 2005 *IFLA/FAIFE World Report*, and FAIFE will continue to monitor and follow up for future reports.

IFLA President Dr Alex Byrne will introduce the programme theme, and the role and social responsibility of libraries and information services in the provision of information about HIV/AIDS will be discussed. During the four-hour programme we will learn about the work of the World Health Library and how the provision of information about HIV/AIDS is tackled in Cuba and South Africa. The four-hour programme will end with a debate monitored by Professor Al Kagan.

IFLA/FAIFE Theme Report 2006

The IFLA/FAIFE Theme Report 2006: *Libraries and the Fight against HIV/AIDS, Poverty and Corruption* was launched at a press conference at WLIC Seoul on 22 August. The report is the sixth volume of the IFLA/FAIFE World Report Series.

"Libraries and the fight against HIV/AIDS, poverty and corruption" takes up some of the big issues and major challenges facing the world today: the HIV/AIDS pandemic, poverty and corruption. Authors from Africa, Asia, Central America and the Caribbean, and Eastern Europe explore the role and responsibilities of libraries and information services, and how they can contribute to this fight.

The authors advocate the engagement of libraries in strong education efforts, implementation of information laws, awareness of the consequences of poverty and corruption, advocating transparency; and enhancing libraries' position in society; and thus increasing the abilities of libraries' successful participation in the fight for equal opportunities, transparency and better public health. In regard to all three themes, the authors draw our attention to the need to identify new responsibilities and values for the library profession.

The IFLA/FAIFE Theme Report 2006 tries to answer the question of why libraries and information services should place stronger emphasis on issues concerning the condition and constraint of the environment in which they are operating, and by doing so recognize their social responsibilities and their role as advocates of intellectual freedom and equal participation in an inclusive information and knowledge society.

The most important messages are that, libraries do indeed have a commitment to engage in the fight against HIV/AIDS, poverty and corruption; and information access and dissemination is a crucial factor in this fight. Information is the only vaccine that helps prevent the spread of HIV/AIDS; literacy is fundamental to the advancement of peoples' lives, and transparency and access to information are vital factors in the control of corruption. Thus by facilitating freedom of access to information libraries contribute to making the world more equal.

This year's report clearly demonstrates the need for libraries' active involvement and support in the fight against HIV/AIDS, poverty and corruption.
