

SAFETY IN DURBAN

The evidence indicates that crime is decreasing in Durban, although there are still very high levels of violent crime, above international norms. However, much of this crime does not affect visitors at all. For example, over 11000 delegates recently attended the third largest world tourism conference during which no incidents of crime were reported.

The authorities have taken a number of initiatives to ensure that crime affecting visitors is minimised. They include:

- Working closely with the conference organisers
- Providing advice on safety and districts which may be unsafe
- Deployment of Metro Police around the clock in the inner city and where tourists will be, together with SAPS and private sector security personnel
- Monitoring via a CCTV system

This has resulted in almost no incidents over the festive season and during major conferences. Metro Police will escort visitors who have gotten lost and there is a tourist protection unit to assist tourists during their stay in the City. There will be a peoplemover which offers a most affordable way of travelling around the inner-city at a cost of R15 (approximately US\$2) per day.

The capacity of Durban and the ICC Durban to host a major event has been demonstrated on numerous occasions. City employees, including its police force, are now familiar with a wide range of major events. In addition ICC Durban personnel are well acquainted with the procedures and protocol requirements and are able to perform under extreme pressure.

The City Liaison Officer and the city's police agencies meet on a weekly basis to review forthcoming events. As the event draws closer, more detailed planning takes place including an overview of the locations where delegates are staying (accommodation), means of transport and walking routes.

Approximately two weeks before the event operational plans are submitted and put into effect. This is a coordinated plan between the policing agencies and the City Liaison officer. A JOC (joint operational command) is set up – often located within the ICC, which monitors on a daily basis the entire event including the external events and functions.




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This has been the policy and practice put into place in Durban since 2004 and has proven to be extremely successful. All city agencies have worked together and results achieved have been excellent.







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
