

WORLD LIBRARY AND INFORMATION CONGRESS ▶ 73rd IFLA General Conference and Council ▶ South Africa, 19–23 August 2007



IFLA has been deliberating the issue of too many special events attached to the annual congress and the costs (time and money) linked to such events. Therefore it will be suggested that future congresses reduce to two special events only.

In light of the above, particularly because of the cost

factor, the organisers for WLIC 2007 took a decision to reduce from four to three special events for the 2007 congress. To achieve this, the Cultural Evening and the Gala Dinner have been combined into one event, now known as the CULTURAL GALA. Because both events were listed on the registration form, your indication to attend the Gala Dinner on Wednesday 22 August will be used instead as an indication to now attend the Cultural Gala on that evening. If you wish to change your indication, kindly inform the organizers.

There is no additional fee payable to attend the above functions, but you have to book for the events on your registration form.

On Sunday, 19 August, the Opening Ceremony will be staged in the new Arena section of the ICC, a brand new venue which was opened in April 2007. As the World Library and Information Congress: 73rd IFLA General Conference and Council draws nearer, the Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA) as host, is working tirelessly together with the National Committee to make this one of the most memorable IFLA Conferences ever.

We are very pleased to have the extensive support of the entire Library and Information sector in South Africa in what is a landmark year for us when we not only play host to all our visitors at this prestigious and important conference, but also celebrate our 10th anniversary.

We are happy to announce that through various partnerships, a large number of South African and African

librarians will be receiving either full or partial sponsorship and travel grants to attend the conference. At the time of going to press, we would especially like to thank South Africa's Department of Arts and Culture (DAC), IFLA, the United States Embassy, Sabinet and EBSCO Information Services. We also received a generous donation from Australian librarians to the tune of AU\$10,609 to pay registration fees for sixteen librarians to attend. The

GCINA MHI OPHE

Born in Hammarsdale, KwaZulu-Natal in 1959, Gcina Mhlophe has been writing and performing on stage and screen for the past 24 years. She has written many children's books as well as adult audience poetry and short stories and plays. Her writings are published all over the world and translated into German, French, Italian, Swahili

and Japanese. Her work is used extensively in many schools and universities. Together with Ladysmith Black Mambazo, Gcina produced and performed a collaboration CD for children - released by Music for Little People (USA) in 1993. She wrote music for the SABC TV series Gcina & Friends where she performed her own stories for television audiences.

In 2000 she released an award-winning storytelling CD Fudukazi's Magic for German audiences. Gcina wrote both the story and music for Fudukazi's Magic - produced for video in collaboration with Anant Singh of VideoVision. She wrote both story and music in collaboration with guitarist, Bheki Khoza, for the Animated Tales of the World Series, for Right Angle TV in the UK as well as the SABC.

In 2001 her CD and book Nozincwadi Mother of Books was produced as part of her nationwide reading road show to South African rural schools. Her work has received awards from BBC Africa Service for Radio Drama, The Fringe First Award in the Josef Jefferson Award in Chicago, and OBBIE in New York. Gcina Mhlophe has received Honorary Doctorates from the London Open University as well as the University of KwaZulu-Natal. The same year saw the publication of her book, African Mother Christmas Maskew Miller Longman, as well as the republication of Love Child (now in English), and Have You Seen Zandile by University of



Maskew Miller Longman published one of her most loved stories Queen of Imbira. Also in 2003 she wrote for Centre for the Book's First Words In Print series with books like, Love In Your Language, and Horns Only. During August and September 2003 Gcina was invited to the prestigious Isabella Stewart

> Gardner Museum in Boston, USA as Writer In Residence where she commenced the work on her debut novel.

In January 2006 she released her CD Songs And Stories Of Africa, co-produced with Bheki Khoza, five stories and seven songs recorded with a full band and children's choir. Gcina represented her country in July 2006 at the Soccer World Cup Germany, the highlight of her performances being the Official Reveal of the 2010 World Cup Emblem for South Africa. The performance was broadcast live around the world to more than a billion

Writing and storytelling continue to be the main focus of Gcina's Creative energies. She lives in Durban with her husband and their daughter Nomakhwezi, the morning star!

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
