The Human Rights & Documentation Centre, Faculty of Law, University of Namibia in collaboration with the Embassy of Finland in Namibia, held a conference from 11th – 12th October 2016 on the theme: Women's Rights and The Role of Women in Poverty Eradication. The Conference attracted more than 100 participants from the local and international arena, including the following countries – Botswana, Cameroon, Finland, Namibia and the USA. The objective of the conference was to encourage dialogue and share experiences on how to promote the rights of women. There was 1 documentary presented on gender based violence and 18 papers were presented on the following sub-themes:

Women in decision making;

The role of women in supporting the national economy;

Gender based violence;

Women's rights to health; and

Harmful & traditional cultural practices.

It was unanimously agreed to at the conference that it is vital to promote women's rights as they are a key component of the society and indeed any aspirations for economic development in any country in the world. To that end, more issues need to be covered in future conferences on the same theme. Male participants to the conference must be increased as this approach will provide a holistic approach to addressing the scourge of gender-based violence and the regrettable exclusion of women from economic participation and development processes. It is hoped that with the continued support from policy makers and social partners, more can be achieved for women in Namibia and beyond. Their rights will be protected in a more defined manner and room for their participation in economic activities will be enlarged.


