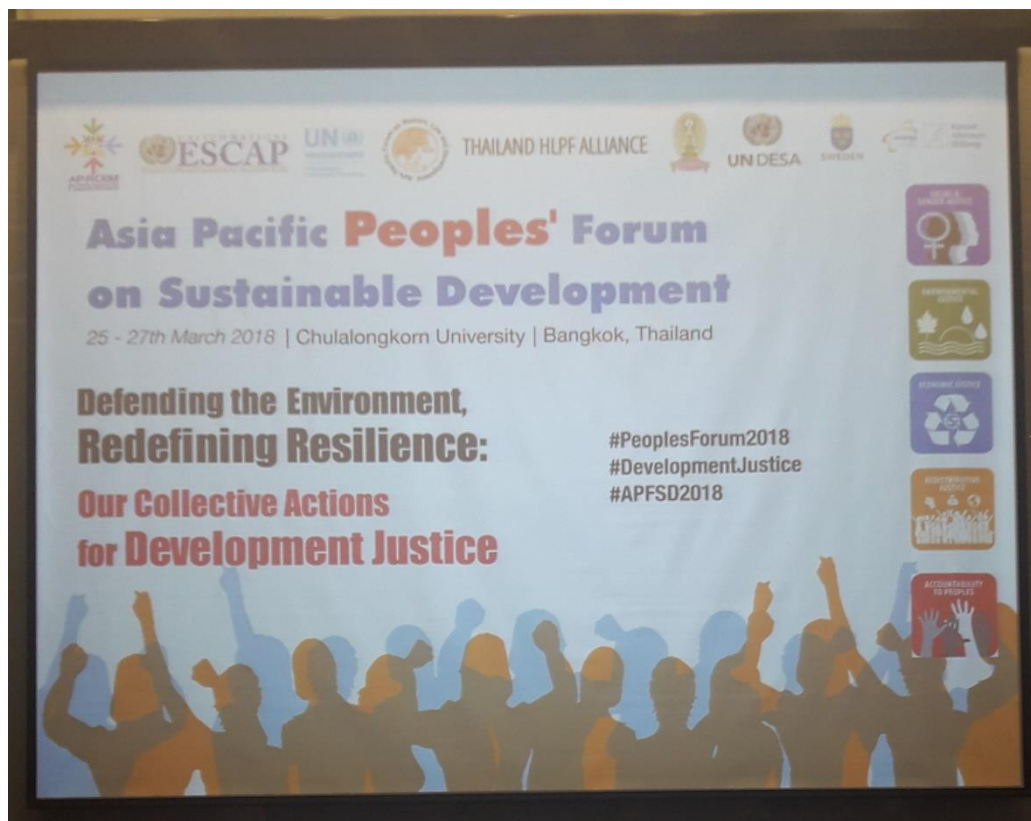

Asia Pacific Peoples' Forum on Sustainable Development 2018



Attended the Asia Pacific Peoples' Forum on Sustainable Development held at the Chulalongkorn University 25-27 March 2018. #PeoplesForum #DevelopmentJustice #APFSD2018

The Asia-Pacific Civil Society Forum on Sustainable Development was organized by civil society (the secretariat represented by the Asia Pacific Forum on Women, Law and Development as a coordinator of the [Asia-Pacific Regional CSO Engagement Mechanism \(AP-RCEM\)](#)), in collaboration with the ESCAP and the United Nations Environment Programme (UN Environment) as a preparatory meeting for the APFSD.

The Asia-Pacific Civil Society Forum on Sustainable Development 2018 is a forum for civil society organizations to work together and consolidate their positions and recommendations for a regional sustainable development agenda. Asia-Pacific CSOs from different sectors and countries will explore common ground and actions, develop common messages and coordinate strategies for more effective

participation in the national, regional and global intergovernmental processes on sustainable development.

The CSO Forum invites applications from nationally registered civil society organizations to work with others to:

1. Foster the sharing and learning from the variety of experiences of organizations and constituencies and to enhance capacity of civil society participants on sustainable development at the national, regional and global levels, and on the opportunities and modalities for engaging
2. these processes, including identifying and dealing with key systemic issues/barriers to the achievement of sustainable development;
3. To help build an understanding of sustainable development as a comprehensive whole with strong inter-linkages across its various dimensions and components; therefore to also link the work of various other CSO campaigns, peoples' movements, grassroots constituencies, scientific and academic communities across national borders;
4. Dialogue on the structure and content of the APFSD with its theme "Transformation towards sustainable and resilient societies in Asia and Pacific" as well as UNEA-4, formulate joint positions, as well as strategize interventions at the APFSD, HLPF, UNEA-4 and other processes; and;
5. Reflect on the work of Asia Pacific Regional CSO Engagement Mechanism and agree on joint actions and follow up to civil society positions adopted to strengthen and support each other's ideas, plans and actions across national borders.

They train peasant communities on sustainable agricultural practices.

In this workshop I took note of the following points:

Systemic issues around Technology for SDGs

1. Alienation (Technology by whom?) top down decisions on technology, absence of democratic governance of tec
2. High tech fixation (Which technologies?) lack of recognition and support for indigenous knowledge systems and local innovations
3. Technology for control (technology for whom?) as a means to assert and reinforce control over resources and people



4. Corporate concentration (through which means?) enabled by intellectual property rights (IPR), trade rules, standards
5. Technology as "neutral"

** I also attended the workshop on Strategies for Communicating Our Movements Effectively Organized by: APWLD, Communication Working Group of APRCEM. This workshop aims to build capacity of grassroots movements, civil society organizations and human rights defenders to bridge the gap between movements and issues they work on and media advocacy. Learnings from this workshop include tactics for strategic media advocacy, pitching news stories, making journalists allies, using social media and creating media campaigns to amplify voice and agenda.

The National Economic and Development Authority is the country's premier socioeconomic planning body, highly regarded as the authority in macroeconomic forecasting and policy analysis and research. It provides high-level advice to policymakers in Congress and the Executive Branch. Its key responsibilities include:

- a. Coordination of such activities as the formulation of policies, plans and programs to efficiently set the broad parameters for national and sub-national (area-wide, regional and local development);
- b. Review, evaluation, and monitoring of infrastructure projects identified under the Comprehensive and Integrated Infrastructure Program (CIIP) consistent with the government's thrust of increasing investment spending for the growing demand on quality infrastructure facilities; and
- c. Undertaking of short-term policy reviews to provide critical analyses of development issues and policy alternatives to decision-makers.
