

What is the Content Creation Guide?

The Content Creation Guide (CCG) is for anyone who writes or edits content for the Stanford Libraries website. It focuses on writing and formatting, as well as some administrative policies for special content types. It is not intended to cover technical "how-to" instructions, however; please use the Feedback form to request training and ask technical questions.

Our goal is to make our web content accurate, useful, interesting, efficient, and accessible for the Stanford community. It is for them, not us.

Our users come to us with specific needs. They're seeking books for a term paper, recent articles on a topic, or materials for a syllabus—and they want it fast. Make sure that your content:

- Speaks directly to the different kinds of users that might visit your page.
- Efficiently helps them find information that they need—or helps them quickly determine that what they are looking for is not on your page.
